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It's Tax Time

Uncle Sam wants ...YOUR MONEY!

Time is up! If you haven't filed your taxes you will have to get an extension from the government. This year the IRS might apply late fee penalties plus interest on taxes owed but fee penalties might not apply for those who will receive refunds. April 15, 2010 was the last day to file federal tax returns for Florida residents. If you have already filed, you may be among the lucky ones to receive your refund early. If you believe your refund was lost, stolen or destroyed, generally you can file an online claim for a replacement check. You'll need to provide the following information from your tax return:

- Your Social Security Number (or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number)
- Your Filing Status
- The exact whole dollar amount of your refund

29th Annual Bridge Run

The Seven Mile Bridge is one of the biggest tourist attractions of the Keys and is thought to be the largest segmented bridge. It connects Marathon to Little Duck Key. It was built in 1979 becoming the highest point in the Keys, only costing 45 million dollars. 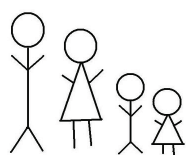

Child Abuse Prevention

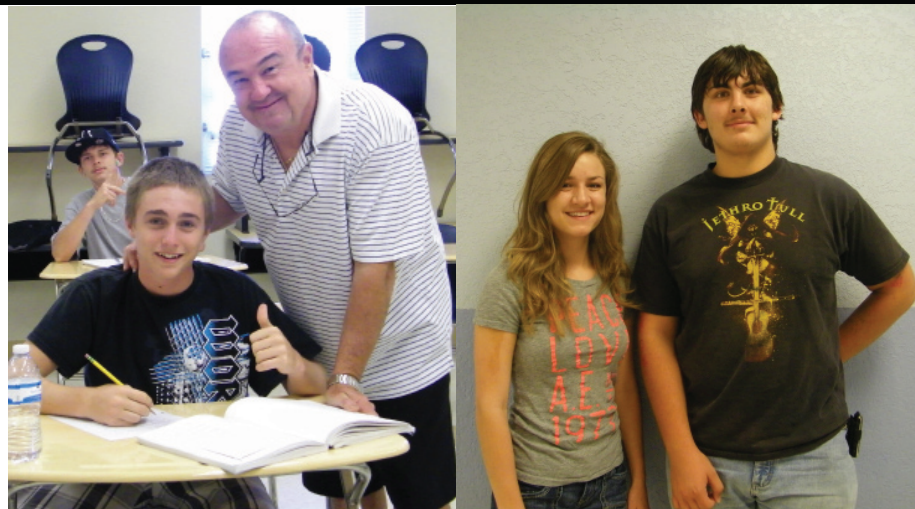

Mrs. Matthews, Life Skills counselor, wanted to remind us that at MHS students are recommended to her by teacher or parents and friends that are concerned about kids. Also, she has been here for so long that students know where to go if they need to talk. Why are gas prices so high?

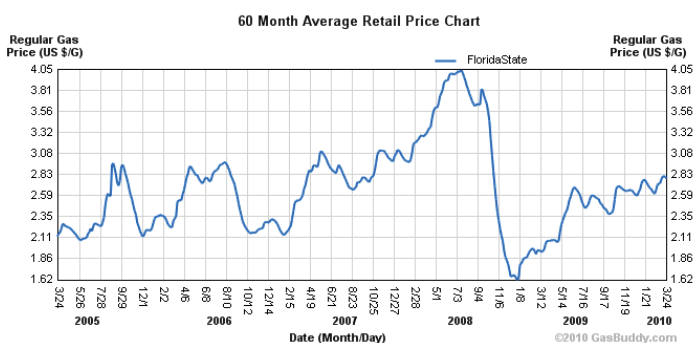
Gas prices have been really high lately. In the spring of 2004, gas prices skyrocketed, and they never went back down. Some people blamed the war; others blamed the oil companies, which were raking in huge profits. There are two expenses involved in getting the oil out of the ground and to consumers: the oil itself, and the refining process. Crude oil itself has risen in price for two main reasons. First, access to crude oil has become increasingly tricky. Regions that produce most of the world's crude oil, like Nigeria, Iran and Iraq, are increasingly unstable. This has a major effect on the price of oil.

But even more important is the increasing demand for oil all over the world. The economies of rapidly developing countries such as India and China are growing beyond anyone's expectations. They need oil for automobiles and heavy industry, and this is putting a strain on the oil supply.

The oil itself is pricey, but the cost of refining the oil adds more than 50% to the cost. For the United States, this has become increasingly expensive over the years because we do less of our own refining. Newer and stricter EPA regulations have made oil refining more costly and less profitable for companies to do stateside. In addition to this, the recent hurricanes Rita and Katrina caused major damage to United States oil refineries in the gulf, and the oil industry still hasn't recovered.

So, what do high gas prices mean to us in the Florida Key? Well for one, people living on Big Pine Key and working in Key West have an expensive fuel cost because that's about a 60 mile round trip every time they go to work. Also, the local fisherman are affected by the rising gas prices and in turn they are raising their prices and people will think twice before paying that kind of money for a fishing trip unless they have a reputable name. For MHS students this also means more students will take the school bus rather than drive to school. So, hopefully, this summer prices will go down and we will be able to drive and plan trips without worrying about the cost.

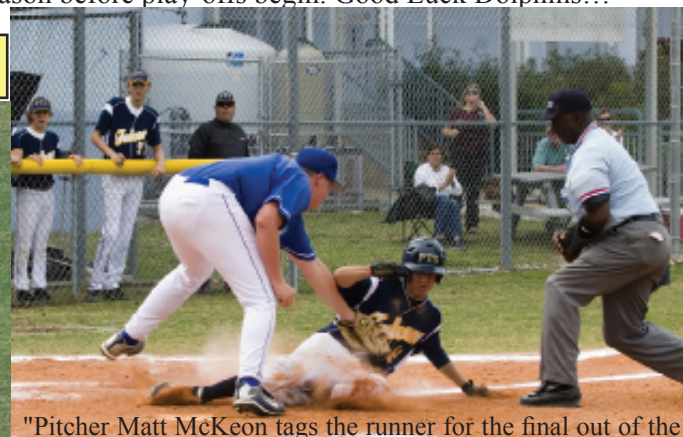
