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Easter celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ on the third day after his Crucifixion. The origins of Easter date to the beginnings of Christianity, and it is probably the oldest Christian observance after the Sabbath. Easter owes its origin to the old Teutonic mythology. It was derived from the name Eostre, the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring, to whom the month of April was dedicated. The festival of Eostre was celebrated at the vernal equinox, when the day and night gets an equal share of the day.

The English name "Easter" is actually more modern. When the early English Christians wanted others to accept Christianity, they de-

cidated to use the name Easter for this holiday so that it would match the name of the old spring celebration. This made it more comfortable for other people to accept Christianity.

The Feast of Easter was well established by the second century. But there had been dispute over the exact date of the Easter observance between the Eastern and Western Churches. The East wanted to have it on a weekday because early Christians observed Passover every year on the 14th of Nisan, the month based on the lunar calendar. But, the West wanted that Easter should always be a Sunday regardless of the date. The

Council of Nicaea in 325, decided that Easter should fall on Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox. The dating of Easter today follows the same every year. Accordingly, churches in the West observe it on the first day of the full moon that occurs on or following the Spring equinox on March 21, it became a movable feast between March 21 and April 25.



April Fools Day

In 1708 a correspondent wrote to the British *Apollo* magazine asking, "Whence proceeds the custom of making April Fools?" The question is one that many people are still asking today.

The puzzle that April Fool's Day presents to cultural historians is that it was only during the eighteenth century that detailed references to it (and curiosity about it) began to appear. But at that time, the custom was already well established throughout northern

Europe and was regarded as being of great antiquity. How had the tradition been adopted by so many different European cultures without provoking more comments in the written record?

References to April Fool's Day can be found as early as the 1500s. However, these early references were infrequent and tended to be vague and ambiguous. Shakespeare, writing in the late sixteenth and early seventeenth centu-

ries, made no mention of April Fool's Day, despite being, as Charles Dickens Jr. put it, a writer who "delights in fools in general."

Many theories have been put forward about how the tradition began. Unfortunately, none of them are very compelling. So the origin of the "custom of making April Fools" remains as much a mystery to us as it was back in 1708.

In the end it was Abigail Connell who reigned victorious.

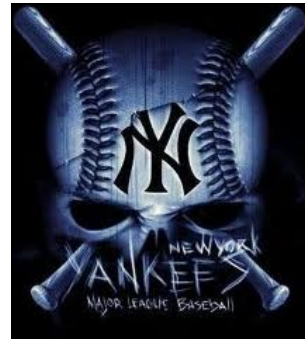

2012 Phillies Season

Right now, the Phillies arrive at Opening Day as one of the top contenders to finish the year with a parade. The Phillies have endured a greater quantity of injuries leaving spring training before. But they've never lost as much quality before opening day as they have in Ryan Howard and Chase Utley. It will be hard for the Phillies pitchers to top their 2011 performance, without Chase Utley and Ryan Howard able to boost the offense. The rotation may have to reach that level again this year. Phillies are now 12-12 this season with their win last night over the

braves.

I expect roughly the same output in 2012 from Ruiz, Rollins, Polanco, and Victorino. Let's say the Phillies lose 30 runs without Howard and 20 without Utley. Remember, these are just rough numbers. I expect Mayberry/Nix/Pierre to essentially equal Ibanez in runs and gain 25 runs with a full year of Pence in right field. That's a drop of 25 total runs as a team. That would give the Phillies 688 runs and would leave their NL ranking unchanged from last year at 7th place. As far as the pitching is concerned, let's assume no change with Halladay, Lee, and Hamels. In Worley's spot, let's say he gives up 10 more runs than last year's combo of Worley and Oswalt. In the number 5 spot, Blanton will give up

roughly the same runs as Blanton/Kendrick last year. I have my concerns about the bullpen, so I'm gonna say the Phils give up 15 more runs in the bullpen. That's a difference of 25 runs for a total of 554 runs given up, still leaving them with the best pitching in baseball.

Robert Capa was born as Endre Friedman on October 22 1913 in Hungary, he adopted the name "Robert Capa" because "Capa" meant "shark" which was his nickname in high school and it was a recognizable American name. He was a photography and photojournalist who was known for covering five different wars. He left home at the age of 18, when he was first starting out he wanted to be a writer but fell in love with photography. In 1938 he traveled to the China to document the Japanese invasion, later in 1936 he became famously known for his photo of "the fallen soldier" which it shows a

solider falling to the ground from a gunshot. During World War 2 he went to Paris for the rise of Nazism and took many pictures including one of a Sicilian peasant showing which way the German troops went to some American soldiers.

In 1936 he and a Jewish refugee named Gerda Taro went to Spain to document the Spanish civil war, Gerda died in Madrid during a battle. In 1943 he fell in love with Ingrid Bergman and she was traveling to Europe where he was staying but she lived in Hollywood and he followed her there to live. In Hollywood he worked for

American international pictures for a short time, but their relationship ended in 1946 and he moved to Turkey. Robert Capa died at the age of 40 on May 25th 1954.
