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Getting Paid & Getting a Grade

Getting paid while getting high school credit? It is possible. With the pre-apprenticeship program at Marathon High School, you can receive three high school credits and earn at least nine dollars an hour at a job that can both interest and educate you.

Although this program may interest numerous students, there are some eligibility requirements. You must be a responsible student, a junior or senior in high school with access to transportation, and a genuine interest in the career after graduation. After completion of the program, students may continue in this career path or choose to go on to college.

Student apprentices are graded by Mr. Naklicki, the teacher/career coordinator and the employer. This grade becomes part of the student's GPA. According to Mr. Naklicki, "Students work in a meaning-

ful position, acquire the skills to take on a position with that business after graduation, while acquiring credits toward graduation and getting paid for the reference."

Some of the positions available are lineman jobs with the Florida Keys Electric Cooperative, maintenance technicians with Florida Keys Aqueduct Authority, marine mechanics with various marinas; hospitality and culinary positions with resorts and restaurants; and teller trainee positions with various banks. About eighteen students participate at this time; I had the opportunity to interview three of them to find out more about their experience in the pro-

You've probably seen them, the small white circular signs that are positioned all along the sides of the roads. They urge motorists to "DRIVE SAFELY;" usually adorned with flowers, stuffed toys, and photos. Have you noticed how many there are?
