The classroom lights were turned off and candles were lit, and if someone unknowingly walked in, they might think it was a strange

scene. But if you were to say the words National Honor Society, the picture would become clearer for most. This is a normal part of the NHS tapping ceremony here at Marathon High.

The National Honor Society was officially established in 1921

by Dr. Edward Rynearson. The first chapter was at the Fifth Avenue School in Pittsburg, PA, the school where Rynearson taught. By 1930, there were more than 1,000 chapters. According to the NHS official site, NHS and its middle school counterpart NJHS, are "the nation's premier organizations established to recognize outstanding high school and middle level students. More



than just an honor roll, NHS and NJHS serve to honor those students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of Scholarship, Lead-

> ership, Service, and Character."

Recently, new members were chosen to be inducted into the Marathon chapter. The first part of induction is the tapping, which occurred on May 1st. Current members walk through the school and when they

find the soon-to-be inductees, they tap them on the shoulder which signifies that they are being inducted. They are then taken to Dr. Bayerl's classroom where the ceremony was held. The president, Katie Greenman spoke about leadership and the vice president Jessica Briar about scholarship. Secretary Melanie Boyd spoke on service, and standin treasurer Ben Dillingham talked

about character. Overall, eighteen new members were chosen which included nine sophomores, eight juniors, and one senior. One of the main focuses of the groups is community service. NHS hosts events such as holiday parties at Grace Jones Daycare, and give the children gifts for Christmas.

The induction ceremony was on a larger scale, held in the auditorium and watched by an audience of family members. After the officers discussed the four main merits, the inductees signed the NHS records book and recited an oath, and officially became members. Since 2002, Dr. Elizabeth Bayerl has been the faculty sponsor for NHS. She believes it is so important because it "puts the focus on leadership and community service". She informed us that everything was done by the manual, which keeps consistency with the national organization. This includes the tapping and induction ceremony.

With only three members last year, National Junior Honor Society has

grown to fifteen members currently. The original three members, Marina Waitt, Alana Vassil, and Hallie Heller continue to serve their positions as chairperson, treasurer, and secretary. 
