TEACH YOUR CHILD ABOUT RESPONSIBILITY

Responsible children do better in school and they grow up to become productive, responsible adults. Children need to learn responsibility. And home is where they learn it best. You can help your child develop responsibility by using the six E's:

- 1. Explain it. Talk about what responsibility means.
- 2. Examine it. Look for examples of responsibility. Did a character on a TV show take responsibility for his actions? Point it out. Talk about it with your child.
- 3. Exhibit it. Your personal example is the strongest way you teach. Let your child see you make responsible choices.
- 4. Encourage it. Help your child think about ways he can be responsible. He might start to pick up his room every day. When he does, be sure you notice and praise him. When he does his homework without nagging, say something.
- 5. Expect it. Set rules and consequences. Now that your child knows what you expect, make sure he follows through. It's not enough to pick up after himself two days a week. Expect that he will do it every day. Make sure there are consequences if he doesn't.
- 6. Evaluate it. How is he doing? After a few weeks, talk again. Be ready to give your child more responsibility when he shows he can handle it.
