ASSESSMENT & ACCOUNTAIBILITY

We are approaching our final four weeks before the spring testing season begins! Schools should be sharing out information on testing schedules and computer adaptive testing with parents and students in preparation for the spring session. Remember that attendance is important and coming to school well rested and ready to learn makes all the difference during the spring testing sessions.

March 4th opens the spring PSAT/SAT window for students in grades 8-12. Schools will be scheduling there testing dates and have until April 26th to complete the spring PSAT/SAT sessions. April 1st through the 12th is our Spring writing window, students in grades 4-10 will participate in the BEST Writing assessment. We are currently in the FSA Retake window for eligible seniors who may have taken the previous FSA assessments and are working towards satisfying their graduation requirements.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Justice Lee of Marathon High School is a two time gold medalist, winning in both the traditional and Olympic weightlifting events at the State meet. Coral Shores' Jennille Aria brought home a silver medal in the traditional event and a sixth place medal in the Olympic category. The Dolphins had two more medalists with Sierra Earnhardt winning a bronze and Ella Dunn earning a fifth place medal in the Olympic category.

EXCEPTIONAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The ESE Department has worked with the state to deliver multiple trainings to over 25 ESE Teachers throughout the district wide who will complete the Florida Alternate Assessment (FAA) for students identified with significant intellectual disabilities. The FAA tests mirror the state required tests and EOCs for grades 3 through 12. As a district we will individually test over 100 students with the specialized standards. The expectation is to see growth and advancement with each academic area of ELA, Math, Social Studies and Science. The FAA testing window opens the week of Feb 26th for 3-8th grade and the week of March 11 for grades 9 – 12. Each student will receive similar scores of proficiency on the tests and be included in growth scores for all students.

FINANCE AND PERFORMANCE

We are all very thankful to Superintendent Axford for allowing payroll to process the mid-February payroll early to surprise us all for Valentines!

During February, five members of the Finance and Performance team attended the FOCUS conference. Topics discussed were finance set-up essentials and mastering internal accounts, streamlining payroll balancing, and seamless fixed assets management.

The Finance Team is going into the budget season, and we are planning to simplify the process this year to better assist our schools and departments. We are also anxiously waiting for the final data from survey three, so we can plan and forecast for the upcoming school year. Thank you to all the schools that encouraged student attendance during the survey week. We appreciate your support!

Risk Management continues to focus on protecting the district and its employees, as well as helping maintain a safe and secure daily workplace for everyone.

Internal Services has just completed the annual inventory for the 2023-24 school year. A sincere thanks to all staff who worked on completing inventory, and a special thanks to Internal Services' newest Property Control Specialist, Maria Portal, who did an excellent job assisting schools and departments to overcome certain challenges that arose this year. Internal Services will be working with MIS in the coming months to make minor adjustments in Focus that will hopefully streamline annual inventory for everyone in future years.

HUMAN RESOURCES AND INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP

Preparations for the 2024-2025 school year are in process for the Superintendent to make recommendations for reappointment at the April 23rd Board Meeting, which is no later than four (4) weeks prior to the teachers' last day of post planning. Reappointment emails were sent to Principals and District Leadership for return to the Certification Office indicating educators and administrators retiring, relocating, renewed, released or on-leave. Annual educators with requirements that must be satisfied by June 30, 2024 to enable renewal of their educator contract, will sign Contingency Agreements. Release Notices will be signed by the Superintendent and sent to schools for distribution by April 23rd to educators not being renewed.

Instructional Transfer Requests are due by April 1st for the 2024-2025 Instructional Transfer Request to be provided to Principals. In selecting teachers for new positions created at or before the beginning of the school year (March 31st to preplanning), first consideration, per Article XIV, Section 1(D), which includes qualifications, training, experience, annual evaluations, and time in the district, shall be given to members of the current Transfer Request staff list who apply before applicants outside the school system are considered. (UTM Article XV: Section 5)

OPERATIONS AND PLANNING

The Monroe County School District is preparing for some change with the disposable items used for serving breakfast and lunch meals. The Food Service Director has been working diligently with the leading vendors in the industry that support K12 school nutrition programs to obtain the best contracted pricing for these products. Our main goal is to replace the plastic sporks and foam lunch trays with more sustainable options for the start of next school year. Other items such as the plastic soufflé cups used for fruit and veggies, and the plastic containers used for salads and sandwiches will also be replaced with eco-friendly solutions.



K-5 MCSD teachers were recently introduced to a new literacy tutoring program called Amira. Amira allows students to choose from several appropriately difficult and engaging texts to read. As students read out loud Amira listens, assesses, and when they struggle, Amira provides feedback and support. Amira marries speech recognition and artificial intelligence with the Science of Reading to deliver personalized and in-the-moment tutoring to students as they practice. We hope to see the program help teachers plan and engage with students to promote growth from our most struggling readers.

MCSD students were able to enjoy an educational field trip to Fort Zachary Taylor State Park for the Civil War Heritage Days. The students were immersed in history and were able to witness engaging reenactments. It was a fun day learning about the past!

In partnership with Title I, MCSD recently participated in the Upper Keys' Winter Festival event, engaging in academic outreach to enhance Parent and Family Engagement. Through collaboration between educators, parents and community members we strive to boost student achievement while reinforcing our connections with stakeholders. Amazing outreach like this allows us to emphasize our dedication to supporting the educational journey of every student!
